LIVING INTO GOD'S DREAM: What's Next for Advent in 2018?

This past fall seemed as busy as any in recent memory for me, and from what I have heard, as busy as Advent has seen in sometime. Well, why not? We have exciting things taking place in the life of this parish, and in the lives of our members. Of course, the major event of the last three months came in the *Dreaming God's Dream for Advent* set of workshops over October and November. Over the course of three days, your vestry members, lay leaders, and other interested parishioners, worked on listening to each other, and inspired by the Spirit, articulated approximately sixteen specific goals to move us forward in our mission and ministry. In 2018, your vestry and other lay leaders will begin to implement the goals and objectives that we discerned and committed to for the life and health of our church during the coming twelve months.

On Sunday, January 28, our Annual Meeting day, we will go into more detail about this process and the goals that we set. To pique your curiosity, here are some of the highlights of the *Dreaming God's Dream for Advent* process

The participants identified three strategic directions for action in 2018:

- I. Reaching Out to Include Others on Our Journey
- II. Developing and Empowering Disciples
- III. Growing in Faith Through Generosity

Beneath each of these strategic directions, the participants committed to specific goals that would bring us into the reality expressed by each direction. These ranged from "increased connection with West Valley leaders," to "starting a food pantry," to "holding an annual celebration of our volunteers," among other fabulous ideas. All the goals are intended to add life and energy to our parish as we seek to serve others in Christ's name, both in our church and our neighbors in the surrounding community.

Be sure to be in attendance for this insightful look into our parish and our goals for 2018 at the Annual Meeting, on Sunday, January 28, beginning at approximately 11:15 AM. The meeting will take place in Paine Hall, and lunch will be provided for all.



In the Steps of the Celtic Saints: Advent offers a Celtic Spirituality Pilgrimage, touring Scotland and England, October 7-17, 2018.

Christians from all denominations have been inspired and amazed at the rediscovery of the story of how the Gospel came to the British Isles. The Holy Islands of Iona and Lindisfarne are now frequent places of pilgrimage. And this coming October in 2018, you and others who join us will have the opportunity to make your own Celtic Spirituality Pilgrimage, to visit Holy



Isle, Iona, Lindisfarne, and North Umbria, and other historic places of the history of the Church of England as we travel through Scotland and England from October 7-17, 2018.

On this amazing journey, we will experience the stories of those places, in those places, and other sacred spots where heaven touched the earth. As well as hearing the stories appropriate to our journeying, we will hear the larger story of how the Gospel went from Roman Britain to Ireland, came back through Wales, Scotland, and England, and spread further, through many parts of Europe. We will meet some of the Characters, held in such affection, that have deeply imprinted Christianity in Britain and beyond.

We will look at why this Celtic version of Christianity is so exciting and relevant for today, and why the hierarchy of the church struggled with insights that we are now embracing again.

On Wednesday, January 10, at 1:00 PM in the Church, and again on Sunday, January 14, in Paine Hall following the 10:00 AM service, Canon Timothy will give a presentation about the Celtic Spirituality Pilgrimage he will be leading in October to walk in the steps of the Celtic saints who spread Christianity across Celtic lands from the early fifth and sixth centuries, before Western Christianity became the practice of the British Isles following the Synod of Whitby in 664. Other stops include: Kilmartin, where standing stones predate Stonehenge; Edinburgh including the Castle; Holy Island of Lindisfarne; Durham; Cambridge; Canterbury and Dover; and London, from which we fly home.

On our journey, we'll be accompanied by the Rev. Simon Airey, a professional storyteller and a member of the Northumbria Community. Simon has been molded by these stories for 20 years. He is an Anglican priest who pastors three churches. Simon lives on the wild marches where England meets Wales with his wife, two children, and a variety of animals.

Etiquette for Communion during the Cold and Flu season



During this cold and flu season, there are several things we can do to protect ourselves and others from passing along a cold virus as we pass the peace or receive communion. At the Peace, instead of shaking hands, consider bowing to one another with hands clasped in front of you, as a sign of greeting one another in the name of the Lord. Many churches have seen people practice this, in

addition to a hearty handshake or hug. Most importantly, while receiving communion, be sure that when you take the cup your finger does not touch or even come near the lip of the chalice—which would be tantamount to putting one's finger in the mouth of the next person. Not nice. Believe it or not, these two practices will be very helpful in reducing any chance of passing along something more than the Peace of the Lord in our worship services. *Thank you!*

Keeping Up With Your Situation: Clairvoyance is NOT a Spiritual Gift

One of the hardest tasks for any parish congregation is keeping up with people when they go into the hospital, or go in for surgery (even if it is outpatient), or if their living situation changes — they move out of one home into another house, or into a retirement home or village, or some similar residence, for health reasons. Like any church, Advent wishes to provide support and care for its parishioners in times like these—times of transition, or times of health and wellness issues.

So you can imagine my heartbreak last month when the Treasurer handed me a parishioner's last quarter's giving statement that was returned to us, with a tersely written note at the bottom. "Your 'pastoral care' didn't reach me when I was in the hospital twice over the last six months!" This person then requested to be removed from our active membership rolls. OUCH. (I'm keeping the name and gender hidden for obvious reasons.)

Honestly, I can't blame this person for their feelings—I would feel that way, too, if in my times of need, my church didn't come to support me, but certainly didn't fail to reach out to me regarding my estimate of giving (pledge) for the year. Over the last eight or nine years, as I have spoken to clergy and lay leaders in dioceses across the Episcopal Church, I have cautioned churches about this. We cannot allow asking for money to be the *only* contact people regularly get from their church—yet, sadly, far too many poorly planned and managed annual giving campaigns often exacerbate this very problem: "They only reach out to me when they want money."

In the case of our Advent parishioner, I believe that we would have reached out to this member and visited them in the hospital and cared for them, if we had known about their need. After receiving this member's note, I did a significant amount of asking around. "Did anyone know about this person's hospitalization?" "Did a call come into the office about this?" "Does anyone know this member?" We knew nothing, either before, during, or after this person's health issues, wherein we could have responded. None of this person's friends—who may or may not be members of Advent—told us anything either. And of course, under the new HIPPA law, hospitals can no longer notify us when a member of our parish goes in for a stay or an emergency room visit.

We wish we automatically knew when members of our church go into the hospital, but clairvoyance is not a spiritual gift. It just isn't. People have to tell us when they go in for a procedure or an extended stay. When we know, we respond as best as we can. In addition to the pastoral care that I strive to offer, we are blessed to have two Licensed Lay pastoral care givers in Sharon Mather and Karin Williams who do amazing work at keeping tabs on our people, as well as our vibrant Parish Visitors ministry, and our new TeleCare Ministry. Plus, we have two deacons and several retired priests who assist in the pastoral care ministry from time to time, in addition to preaching and celebrating the sacraments of the altar.

Yet we can only attend to those whose needs we know about—so help us help you, and help us help others. If you find yourself in the hospital and you need pastoral care, please have a family member or friend call us and give us the particulars so we can minister to you. If you know of someone from Advent who is in the hospital, let us know; even if we already know, it's better to be redundant than not responsive at all. True, it's possible we still might miss someone, but with your help we can certainly increase our chances of responding to and serving all those in need when we actually KNOW of the need. Thank you, in advance, for helping us all care for one another, as the Gospel compels us to do.

This is for all persons (and their sponsors) who wish to be baptized, to be received in this communion, or who wish to reaffirm their faith in the presence of the bishop at the Easter Vigil on March 31, at 7:00 pm. INTRODUCING THE "ADVENT MEMORIAL GARDEN & CHAPEL"

Formerly known as "ALL SOULS CHAPEL", the vestry approved the name change to better identify with the role of the burial garden and columbarium on the Advent campus. History would tell us the original plan was to build a chapel where Paine Memorial Hall now exists. The chapel was never built. The name carried forward to the burial garden but clearly did not properly reflect the function. At the same time, the vestry appointed a new committee chaired by Bob Stewart and supported with committee members Nita Martin, Glenn Gullickson and Tom Barnes to oversee operations going forward. Our sincere thanks to Rich Raszkiewicz, who along with Tom Barnes, managed the operations for a number of years and did a great job. There are several changes in progress Including attaching the lettering of the new name on the entry wall.

For information purposes, particularly for new members, the Advent Memorial Garden & Chapel offers burial options for interment of ashes for those who chose cremation. The practice of cremation is an appropriate and church approved way to treat human remains once the spirit has departed to be with God. The walled garden adjacent to the church is for in-ground burial. Adjacent to the Memorial Garden is the Columbarium where ashes can be interred in wall niches.

It should be noted the Memorial Garden and the Columbarium are available for use by Advent members and their immediate families only. We also have a Wall of Remembrance for those who have chosen to be buried or interred elsewhere and wish to be remembered at Advent.

For informational purposes, you may be interested to know there are presently 684 plots in the Garden. There are approximately 225 reserved or occupied leaving 459 plots available. In the Columbarium, there are 72 niches in the current structure with 25 remaining available for purchase. At present, the plots are sold individually for \$600 each. The niches can include up to two urns and are marketed at \$1500 each. There is space to extend the capacity of the Columbarium as needed. The Vestry reserves the right to adjust these fees at any time in the future.

The committee invites all members to view the facilities, ask questions or offer comments. We are sincerely interested in encouraging you to consider the Advent Memorial Garden & Chapel in your estate plans.
