Isaiah calls out to God on behalf of the people. They have spent long enough in exile and oppression, they are desperate to be rescued and to be cherished, they see how their own behavior has brought them here, and they are ready to repent.

A READING FROM THE PROPHET ISAIAH [64: 1-9]

O that you would tear open the heavens and come down, so that the mountains would quake at your presence—as when fire kindles brushwood and the fire causes water to boil—to make your name known to your adversaries, so that the nations might tremble at your presence! When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence.

From ages past no one has heard, no ear has perceived, no eye has seen any God besides you, who works for those who wait for him. You meet those who gladly do right, those who remember you in your ways. But you were angry, and we sinned; because you hid yourself we transgressed. We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a filthy cloth. We all fade like a leaf, and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away. There is no one who calls on your name, or attempts to take hold of you; for you have hidden your face from us, and have delivered us into the hand of our iniquity. Yet, O Lord, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand. Do not be exceedingly angry, O Lord, and do not remember iniquity forever. Now consider, we are all your people. *The Word of the Lord.*

¹ Hear, O Shepherd of Israel,

leading Joseph like a flock; *

shine forth, you that are enthroned upon the cherubim.

² In the presence of Ephraim, Benjamin, and Manasseh, *

stir up your strength and come to <u>help us</u>.

³ Restore us, O God of <u>hosts</u>; *

show the light of your countenance,

and we shall be <u>saved</u>.

⁴ O LORD God of <u>hosts</u>, *

how long will you be angered despite the prayers of your people?

⁵ You have fed them with the bread of <u>tears</u>; *

you have given them bowls of tears to drink.

⁶ You have made us the derision of our <u>neighbors</u>, * and our enemies laugh us to <u>scorn</u>.

⁷ Restore us, O God of <u>hosts</u>; *

¹⁶ Let your hand be upon the man of your <u>right hand</u>, *

the son of man you have made

so strong for your<u>self</u>.

¹⁷ And so will we never turn a<u>way from you</u>; *

give us life, that we may call upon your <u>Name</u>.

¹⁸ Restore us, O LORD God of <u>hosts</u>; *

show the light of your countenance,

and we shall be <u>saved</u>.

The Corinthians are encouraged by the opening words of Paul's letter, that God's Holy Spirit is active in their midst and is a witness of their faithfulness.

A reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians: (1:3-9)

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind-- just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you-- so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.
